Extract A

Adventure Babies

Adventure Babies is a UK-based business that offers story-reading classes to children up to four years old. The classes focus on making the stories real for the babies and young children. Helped by the use of props* to stimulate the five senses (sight, sound, touch, smell and taste), the class leader (storyteller) reads a book to the children.

The aim of *Adventure Babies* is to help with the child's physical, social and emotional development, as well as starting a love of reading and books.

Adventure Babies was created by Emma Garbett in 2013 and now operates as a franchise. The business currently runs classes in 70 areas across the UK, each with its own class leader (franchisee).

Each franchisee pays £174 per month for the franchise in their local area. In return they receive full training, all the resources needed, ongoing support and help with marketing. The franchisee must pay for the premises used for each class but they have control over where the classes take place.

The price for an *Adventure Babies'* class varies. It is often dependent on the cost of the premises used by the class leader.

Extract B

Jennifer, Adventure Babies' franchisee

Jennifer became an *Adventure Babies'* franchisee in 2021. She had previously worked as a primary school teacher but had no experience of running a business. For the first three months, Jennifer's mother gave her the money to pay the fee of £174 per month to the franchisor.

By 2023, Jennifer had established three regular classes in her franchise area. The price was £8.50 for each child.

In September 2023, Jennifer's total costs were £952 per month. These costs were all fixed costs. There were no variable costs.

Extract C

Belmont Estate

Belmont Estate is a plantation established on the Caribbean island of Grenada in the 17th century. Since 2017, its main activity has been chocolate manufacturing.

The 'tree-to-bar' range of organic chocolate is produced from cocoa grown on the 1.6 km² plantation. Natural flavours such as mango, banana and ginger are absorbed into the cocoa from crops growing close by, so that *Belmont Estate* can produce chocolate with unique flavours.

Batch production of the chocolate is used and is labour-intensive, from picking the cocoa to wrapping the chocolate bars. Despite the size of the plantation, the production process is well-organised, making it efficient. *Belmont Estate* prides itself on its reputation and the quality of chocolate produced, allowing it to sell at a price of \$7.50 for a 55 g chocolate bar.

10

The owners of *Belmont Estate* offer a happy and positive place to work. The business aims to support the local community by providing employment and preserving the environment. These aims are well-received by visitors who enjoy tours of the plantation, as well as the increasing number of importers of *Belmont Estate's* chocolate bars, most of whom are in the US.

Tours of *Belmont Estate* are run whenever there is a demand, whether from an individual visitor or a bus full of tourists. The price of a tour is \$6.00. It is possible to book a tour through *Belmont Estate*'s own website or through *Viatour*, a tour business. However, if a tour is booked through *Viatour*, it charges 17% of the tour price as a fee for taking the booking.
